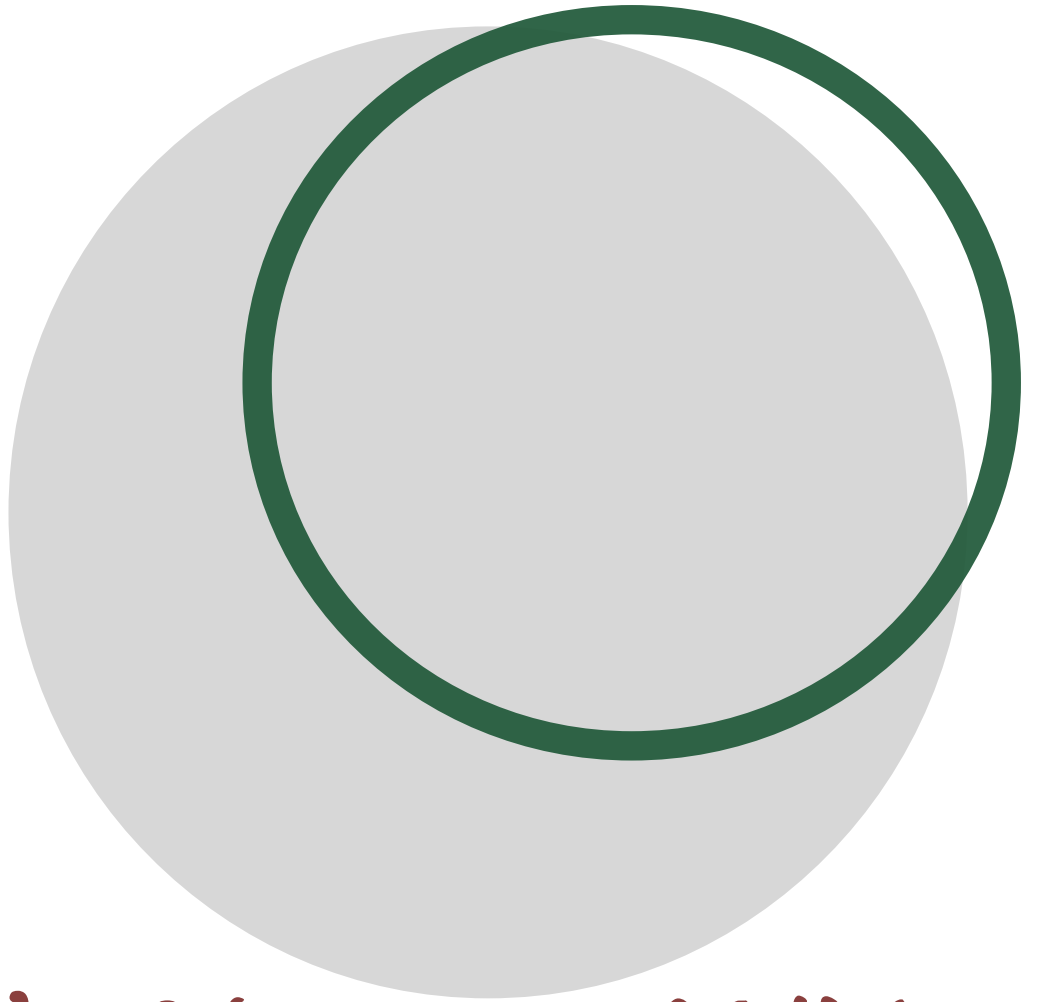

AUK student council was on hold for two years due to the low number of candidates, but they are back in action for the academic year AY 2020-2021. Our student council body looks into graduation, virtual works loads,

and any other student complaints. It is also a practice of democracy and demolishing hierarchal barriers between the administration and the students for a better experience for both parties. Meet our student council members for this year:

## Why did the members join the Student Council?

Secretary: I was not planning on it in the beginning. I was very hesitant, but it got to a point where I got tired of complaining and not seeing results or changes. As cheesy as this will sound, I thought I might as well be the change I want to see.

Treasurer: why not?

President: I joined the student council to help make life for AUK easier the best way I can and help students with any problems they might be facing as students of AUK.

Vice President: I decided to run for the position of Vice President to maintain the functionality of the council in case the president was not able to at any point of time. Also, to help the president with his responsibilities if need be.

Public relations and marketing committee chair: Why wouldn't I join the student council? I was given the opportunity to help AUK rise and reach its full potential! Instead of complaining about all that is wrong with AUK, why not do something to fix it?

Judicial committee chair: I have joined the student council to connect with the student demands regarding administration and make the university a better place to study.



### **What is the Student Council, and why is it important to the curriculum for the university?**

Bousakher states: “The student council are the official representatives of students for the university. They help make the students lives easier and gives a voice to the students and a platform to share their interest and concerns.”

Al-Mutawa states: “It is the official representative of the student body. It serves the function of bridging the gap between the students, university faculty and the administration, if there is any. Any unionized body whether it is a student or labor body is crucial to unifying their voices and needs. Students have the opportunity to manifest what they wish or hope for to happen and/or exist within the confinement of the academic institution and that is indispensable.”

### **What are the processes to be part of the Student Council?**

To join, an individual must have:

- completed at least 30 credits,
- registered for a minimum of 12 credits,
- maintain a GPA of at least 2.5,
- must not be on probation for violating the Code of Conduct at the time of elections.

Student Life usually sends out an email when elections are coming up so that interested applicants can contact them. They ask for the student’s basic details and a transcript, and the position the student is running for. The next step would be the election period for applicants to promote themselves for the position they’re running for. Farhanian said, “For us, there were not enough applicants to have a public election, so we had an internal election, as per the Student Council constitution.”



## **What traits should an SC candidate possess?**

Bousakher states: “Candidates should have leadership skills, teamwork skills, and have a calm understanding. They should have traits that are concurrent with a willingness to go through any potential misunderstandings in their careers within the Student Council.”

Al-Mutawa states: “Flexibility and pragmatism are the two most essential traits a candidate should have.”

## **What are the current projects or concerns SC is working on?**

When asked about their agenda for this semester, the SC president announced that their agenda is yet to be confirmed. But once it does, the updates will be sent out via email to students. Their main concern is summer registration and finding the proper solution for students. In addition to that, problems like the lack of variety of courses, unavailability of courses, the lack of trust in the SET system, and many more. They are also hopeful that we can do something for the graduating seniors. Since the SC is operating virtually, they are using different methods of communication. They have a group chat for simple day-to-day messages. They use Teams for messaging staff members, emails for official communication with staff and faculty, and Zoom for their meetings. SC body concluded their talk by addressing that students lost trust or belief that things can change, but they strongly advise students to communicate with them.

Treasurer of SC adds, “Let us know what you’re going through and what you hope to see change. Rant to us! It is why we’re here in the end. Our goal is to help improve your experience; we can’t do that if we don’t know what’s lacking for it.

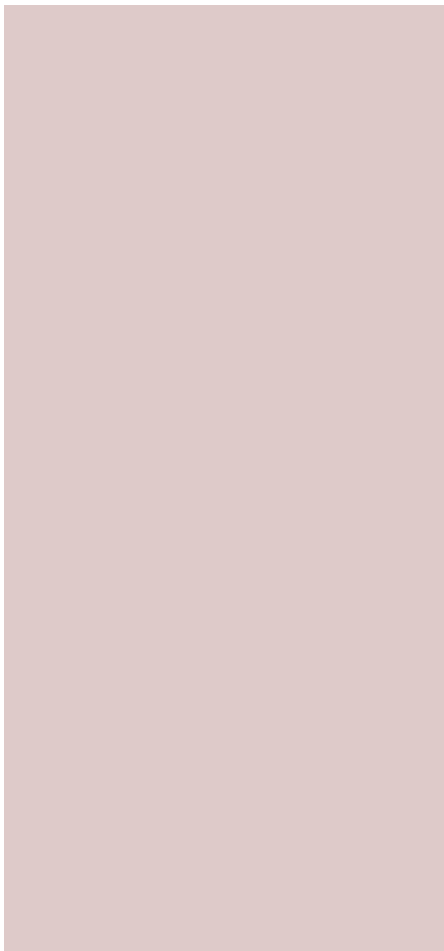
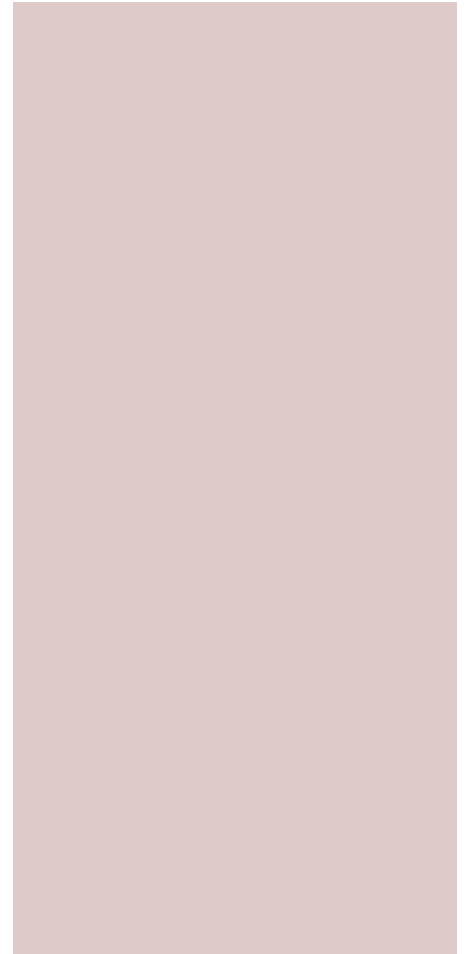

As we start our fourth semester online, we are almost entirely disassociated from our campus. We cannot put a timeline on when university goes back to onsite education, but we have compiled everything you need to know about AUK's newest updates.

AUK has put its complete effort into recreating the campus environment within virtual portals. All AUK departments are now operating online, along with the writing and tutoring centers both use Zoom for academic sessions with students. Student life is active on their Instagram: @aukstudentaffairs. They also send out emails for interactive competitions and raffles that are happening around the virtual campus. Access to the campus is still restricted; hence if you are finishing paperwork, you will need to wait outside the gate for the staff to assist you.



## **Involvement fair:**

The virtual involvement fair started in Fall 2020 via Zoom, and the invitation is open to all AUK students. Usually, the involvement fair is set in the main hallway with a booth for every club. Virtually, the event takes place on Zoom, with the executive members introducing the club, its mission, and upcoming events. The virtual event includes a Q&A as well for students who are interested in joining the clubs.

## **Graduation:**

2020 was the first year where AUK had no graduation or senior pictures held. However, this was a global dilemma as almost no graduates last year had a typical graduation. As for this year, the situation is no different! We contacted the Alumni Affairs office, and they informed us that nothing was decided for this year's graduation. Though I am a graduate, I can assume that no in-person graduation will occur unless the population gets vaccinated. We can speculate that it is either a virtual graduation, a drive-through graduation or a postponed graduation. As for the senior launch, it took place on March 31st as a virtual event. It was planned to be a drive-through senior launch, but due to the 5 pm curfew, that was not doable.

## **President and Deans Honor Roll:**

President and Deans Honor Roll for Spring 2019 students was a reel video on Instagram. The President's opening remarks were filmed around campus, followed by the list of student names. The reel is still available to view on @aukstudentaffairs.


## Events

# Dr. Shayma & “Lan Asket”, لن اسكت

For this issue of the Voice, the team had the privilege of having a conversation with Dr. Shayma Shamo a 27 year old doctor, who pioneered in starting the “Lan Asket” awareness campaign and Instagram account to bring attention to the unfortunate societal phenomenon of harassment in Kuwait. As many cultural issues go- there is a great deal of contention and nuance that begets the symptomatic patterns leading to it becoming a phenomenon- making it a fair assessment to say- that they are far from one-dimensional; and moreover, understanding the characteristics of a societal problem- and confronting it- is the first step in solving it.

Dr. Shayma has so far worked with the concerned activists on this matter to spread awareness and foster potential for resolutions- some of whom, are even alumni of AUK- such as Ascia Al Faraj. The Lan Asket Instagram account which was launched in January, presented the opportunity for victims of harassment to share their stories anonymously, acting as a platform for emotional release, and awareness. Dr. Shayma’s drive for positive change is in line with the spirit of the university, and in that regard, in line with the spirit of the VOICE- and as such, our conversation went as follows:

## -What is “Lan Asket”?

“Lan Asket’s main aim is to act as a virtual safe space for people who are victims of harassment. However, we are now in the process of expanding to all forms of gender based violence and the idea behind it was- the fact that there are no safe spaces for any person who is a victim; to be able to go and to open up and feel like they can talk except maybe like some mental health services which are insanely expensive. It’s primarily a safe space for people to speak- however, later joining the team of “Amana” which is a group that were more focused on making concrete changes to fight harassment. So I’m not doing it via the page of Lan Asket and that’s because I really want it to remain as a safe space. However, through Amana, we began to work on more solid changes, meeting with members of parliament.





# Don't harass her

**-Where would Lan Asket fall in the timeline for activist groups in Kuwait?**

“You have to remember that women were only given the right to vote in the early 2000’s; I think it’s just now that with the new generation of women who believe and trust in the fact that we have a voice and we have a voice that needs to be listened to in our community- which is leading to change. We cannot forget all of the work that other NGOs have done to pave the way, such as abolish 153- which has allowed for many to break the silence and speak about the issues that matter.”

**-Why did you choose the name of ‘Lan Asket’ for this campaign?**

“The main idea behind it was based on the fact that I felt like a lot of the roots of this issue, among many, but one of the roots of this issue when it comes to gender based violence in Kuwait is the deafening silence. That comes from both the victims and then the community around the victims. And I felt like if we want to fight any form of gender based violence, we need to remove that silence and we need to allow victims of space to speak.

**-The Google forum linked on the Lan Asket Instagram account, has an option for ‘type of harassment’, what is that about?**

“It’s really important to remind ourselves that harassment is not only sexual; however, sexual harassment gets a lot of attention due to the vulgar nature of it, but harassment can present itself in different ways. It can be racial, directed at certain ethnicities, it can be ethnocentric, wherein it can be directed at people of different nationalities. Harassment can be physical without the sexual aspect, harassment can be online- through blackmail, and it could be through stalking, which is very common in Kuwait. And I think it’s really important to recognize these different types of harassment, because if we’re going to sit and talk about the different actions harassment can encompass, which is huge- ranging from verbal and non-verbal, physical gestures, etc. However, if we break it down, and categorize the malicious intents- and categorize them, It makes it a lot easier to slowly create the policies and try to think of different solutions for each type of harassment to really eradicate it. The intentions of someone who is harassing you sexually is going to be different than someone who is harassing you racially, physically, etc.”

**-What role does social media have to play in spreading awareness?**

“People really recognize the power of social media, it’s open to the public and is a great way for ideas to gain traction, so even with the lan-asket account, I’ve decided to take an unorthodox approach, when it comes to running it. We really need to start utilizing social media a lot more effectively and a lot better when it comes to campaigning for these sort of causes. I saw how NGO’s running refugee based social media accounts could help in aiding them with asylum applications, and connecting them with services they needed, so in that regard we really need to start utilizing it for different issues in Kuwait’s like harassment and gender based violence. When it comes to social media, it broke a barrier, different women from different countries with different backgrounds are given an equal voice and can be heard by all.”



### **-What's the end goal for Lan-Asket?**

“Really the end goal is to simply exist as a safe space. We have nothing to promote. We have nothing to sell; it's really just to give people a safe space to talk about their experiences. We hope that in the future that once we grow a bit more as a campaign we can start to work providing support services for victims of harassment through Amana. Really our mission statement is to end harassment in Kuwait. 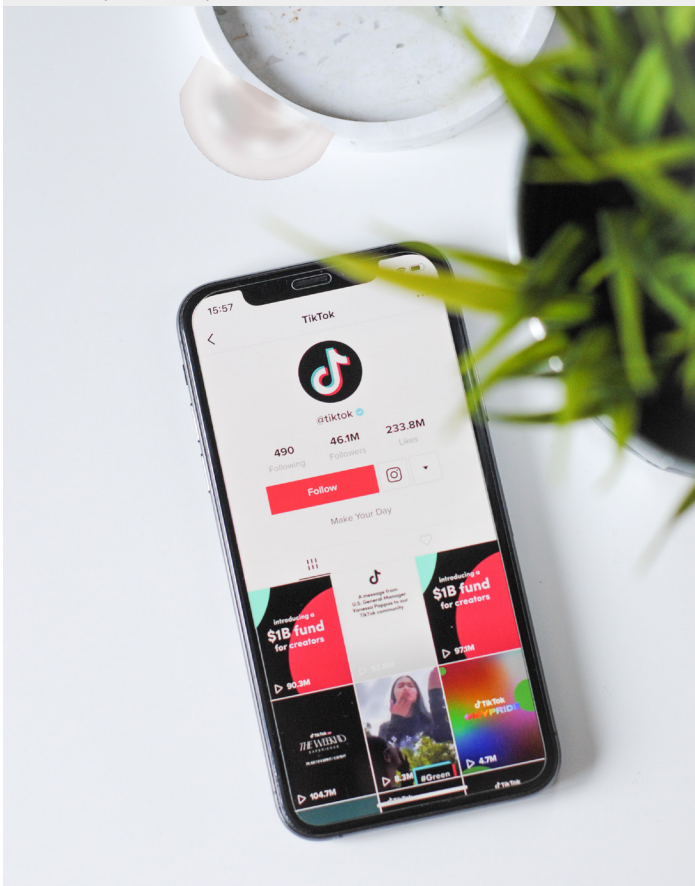

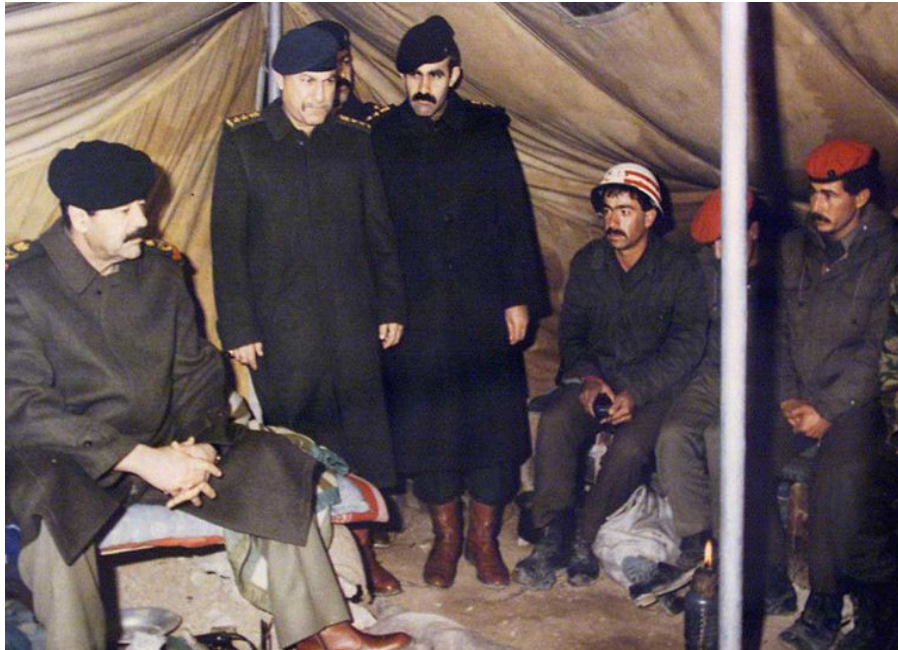


# Kuwait in 1990-1991---: Visual storytelling

In February, we commemorate the invasion of Kuwait in 1990 but one thing words cannot do is convey real life events. With the help of Getty pictures, a universal photo resource and other news agencies, we collected a photo archive for 1990-1991. This photo archive does not just show a visual sequence of the invasion, but it also depicts the struggles and the stories that are embedded within every photo.

Before we jump in to the photo story, let me introduce photojournalism to you. Though you have probably encountered photojournalism at least once in your life if you consumed any sort of academic media. Photojournalism focuses on interesting angles to match the captured scene that tells a story. Most photojournalists use war zones as a ground base for their work, which has its own ethical consideration. While looking at the photo archive, I came across blood scenes and explicit violence between 1990 and 1991 which I will not include for the sake of keeping this visual exploration light and informative. To add on that, one thing that did not have a strong presence prior to Kuwait's invasion is news coverage. Television channels like CNN started multimedia coverage from alternative and international coverage and photojournalism during 1990 and that is when people started following the news. This war was one of the first few televised wars, and its visuals commemorate the mixed of emotions that occurred within that time frame.



Let us have a look at pre-war tension: though the invasion of Kuwait was a two-day operation done by the Iraqi military which later lasted for seven months on 2 August 1990. The execution started that day but Saddam Hussein's plan to invade Kuwait was planned months prior. The intention is forcefully control Kuwait's resources, mainly oil.

With that being said, the following picture shows dictator Saddam Hussein (left) with Iraqi troops in occupied Kuwait in 1990-1991. Followed by a picture of Iraqi soldiers on their way to Kuwait on 3 of August. Three days later, as a reaction to the invasion, Kuwaiti people peacefully protested as a mark of resistance and solidarity, and within the same day, the UN Security Council imposed a worldwide trade ban on Iraq.







Though the UN gave the Iraq a deadline to pull their troops from Kuwait, the warning did not work, and the refugees were flooding across neighbouring countries like the image we see for the Kuwaiti man waiting on the border with whatever he can bring with him from his home on top of his car.

Looking at another stop for refugees due to the invasion is the Jordanian border; in this picture we see a flood of cars waiting to cross the border; the heat of August radiates off the picture as the direct sunlight accompanies the long queue of cars, and a crowd of people over buses stuck at the border as well.



After months have passed, looking at Human Rights Watch report for 400,000 ,1990 Kuwaitis turned to refugees due to the Iraqi invasion. Fast-forward to November, the U.N. security council authorised the use of force against Iraq if the troops do not withdraw by the 15th of January, 1990. Prior to this decision, we see US troops, Cavalry Division crossing the Saudi desert as standby for the U.N.'s decision on November 1990 4. The U.S had a clear part in the liberation of Kuwait and pursued justice for the two nations. Here we see a picture of U.S. Pres. George H.W. Bush showing a political stance in congress for Kuwait and discussing the U.S. intentions to assist Kuwait to restore its peace and stability.

Though the US previously sent its troops to Kuwait, there was no execution of the plan till the beginning of 1991 after the refusal of Iraqi troops to cooperate with the UN security council. One aspect we need to look at is the damage this invasion has done to the architectural landscape. A prime example is schools like The New English School some of destruction still remain present to this day like.

On the liberation day, 26 of February 1991, we see a major shift in our theme of pictures, this documenting the first liberation march and celebration. 30 years after the invasion, we see visuals that commemorate the war in museum around Kuwait like Therka museum, located at Alshaheed park. Thekra museum includes a collage of small pictures of martyrs placed within the walls of the park with their named below. They say the pen is mightier than the sword, but nothing will ever replicate the real-life event like photos do.

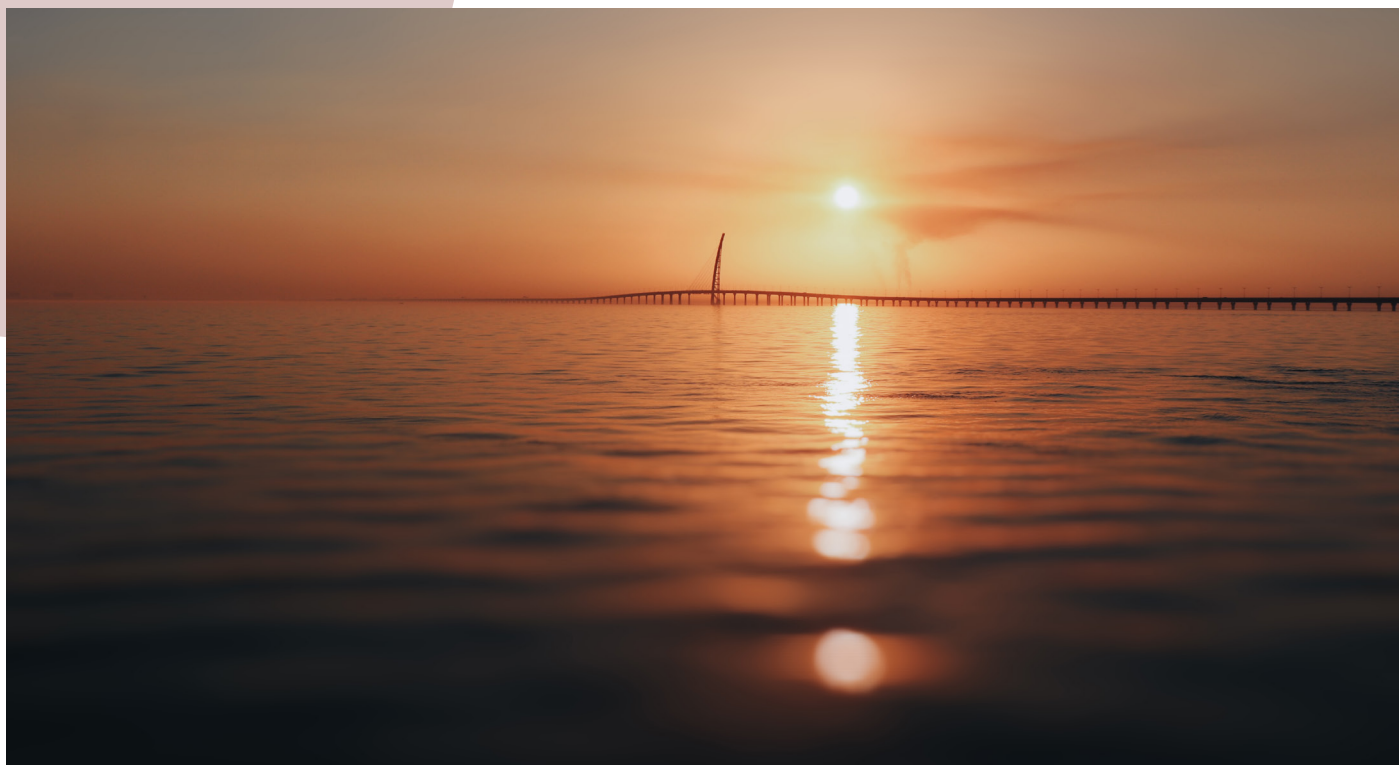

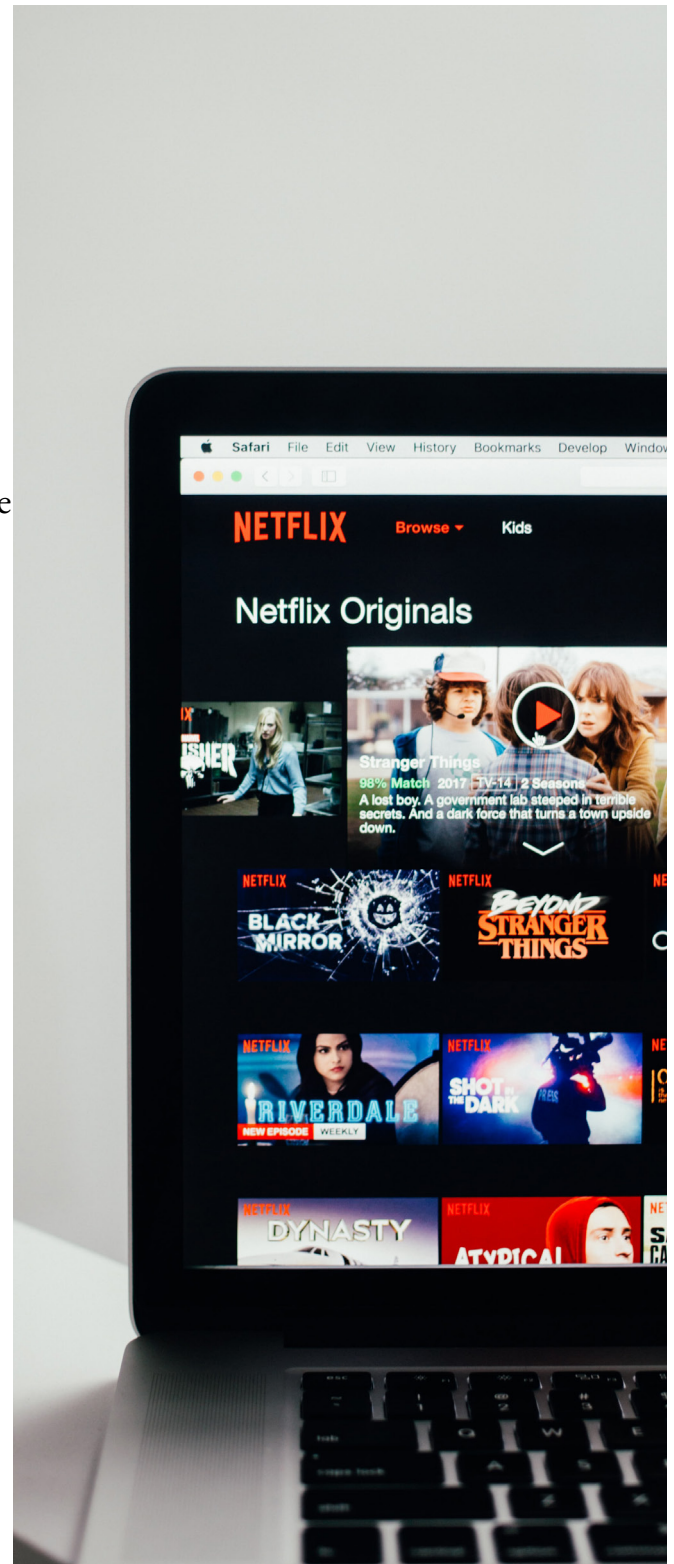
